This month the students will be working on different emotions and how to deal with them. The students are dealing with different moods also. We want to improve their social skills so they can be successful in and out of the school setting.

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# Math w/ Mrs. Jennifer



All students in High School Math classes have been solving problems related to the new math standards as well as developing strategies that strengthen their understanding of mathematical relationships. Every Thursday students participate in Math Strat Chat which is posted on social media by Pam Harris. Students are encouraged to solve math problems using strategies that promote thinking and relationshipbuilding rather than just memorization and answergetting. We discuss the

strategies as a group and consider which strategies we would like to try in the future. Algebra students are studying linear relationships and exploring problems that involve linear equations and inequalities. Students are expected to understand linear relationships verbally, graphically, and algebraically. In Financial Algebra and Financial Literacy, students have learned the true cost of car ownership. They understand that borrowing money to buy a car will mean they spend significantly

more for the car and that depreciation means that the car will be valued significantly less by the time they pay off the loan. Advanced Algebra students have been studying exponential functions and will spend a little time exploring logarithms.

### Science w/ Mrs. Shemeka & Mr. Chris

As we are moving swiftly through this school year, we have covered quite a bit of ground. The Green power students have completely disassembled the car and are in the process of putting it back together. While reassembling the car, they are learning the aspect of what it takes to be part of a team. Each student had to dress for success and interview for the position they wanted on the team. So yes parents, your

sons all know how to create a resume and fill out an application. On the educational side of GP, they are learning the terminology that correlates with GP and testing over that.

Environmental Science students are in Unit 2 of the lesson. This year is more project based. The guys are doing a lot of research and projects in their learning segments. In unit 1, the students covered Planet Earth. Unit 2 they are working on

Rhythms of Planet Earth. Both of these units allowed the boys to learn more about El Nino and La Nina. They have constructed weather cyclonic cycles showing how the wind is traveling due to the warm and cold fronts. They have also looked into volcanic eruptions and the impact it has and are having on different areas.

Lastly, Biology students have covered cells and cellular structure. The students did an Enzyme lab as well as an egg osmosis lab. They are now in unit 3 which covers Genetics. We are looking forward to seeing what new things we can find out about what we have inherited from our ancestors.

# ELA w/ Mrs. Mary & Ms. Adrian



11th Literature - This unit has been designed to develop students' reading, writing, thinking, and language skills through exercises and activities related to The Crucible by Arthur Miller. The lesson introduces students to the Puritans and witchcraft hysteria. Through reading Miller's The Crucible, students gained a better understanding of the Salem witch trials and the Puritans. Students demonstrated their understanding of the text on four levels: factual, interpretive, critical and personal, also consider the themes of crime and punishment, individual vs. authority, and revenge. They were exposed to a different era of American life, showing many of today's conflicts are not new; they are rooted in our American past. By being exposed to the path of John Proctor's personal development, students learned about a



citizen's responsibility to become involved in his world.

10th Litera-

ture - The goal for this unit is to analyze how complex characters (e.g., those with multiple or conflicting motivations) develop over the course of a text, interact with other characters, and advance the plot or develop the theme. Students also analyzed how an author's choices concerning how to structure a text, order events within it (e.g., parallel plots), and manipulate time (e.g., pacing, flashbacks) create such effects as mystery, tension, or surprise. Students were able to recognize these characters



while reading "Contents of a Dead Man's Pocket" and Swimming to Antarctica".

Journalism – The goal for this unit required critical

thinking and exposed students to news, news sources and how to write the news. Writing a good news lead and using the inverted pyramid structure to learn how to write news for both print and televised. Students watched the movie "All the President's Men" as they learned about the Code of Ethics in journalism. Students are presently working to publish a school newspaper.

### African American Studies w/ Ms. Camille

In our African American Studies course, we've been studying the period from the end of Reconstruction to the Jim Crow era.

After Reconstruction ended in 1877, the rights African Americans gained started to fade. Political compromises and the removal of federal troops from the South left African Americans vulnerable to discrimination and violence. The Jim Crow era that resulted, enforced racial segregation

through laws mandating separate facilities for African Americans. The 1896 Plessy v. Ferguson Supreme Court decision upheld this segregation, leading to decades of systemic racism. This era was marked by injustice, but it also laid the foundation for the resilience that fueled the Civil Rights Movement. As we continue our exploration, we encourage reflection on this era's legacy.

Students are now reading

books such as:

Invisible Man by Ralph Ellison

The Help by Kathryn Stock-

Dear Martin by Nic Stone

We will later be following up with the Harlem Renaissance and the different ideologies of black leaders in the early Civil Rights

Era. The 2nd project based on their chosen reading is due October 4th. A mid-

term exam will follow after careful review.

### Middle School w/ Ms. Brittney & Mrs. Sherry

In Ms. Brittney and Mrs. Sherry's class students in English class have been reading The Other Wes Moore, which tells the story of two Black men with the same name: Wes Moore. Both men grew up enduring similar hardships, but Moore, the author and narrator, was encouraged to overcome these difficulties and became successful, while Wes, his counterpart, found himself sentenced to life in prison for murder. Students will work hard to draft final projects in response to the text as well as view the movie. In Social Studies 7th grade will test over Africa and move into Southern and Eastern Asia. 8th grade just finished Economics and Exploration. We closed out the month reviewing all the material

covered in the first unit using a Football Review Game in preparation for our tests. We would like to thank all stakeholders for their continued support. ### **PBIS**

What is PBIS? PBIS stands for Positive Behavioral Interven-

tions and Supports. It is an approach schools use to promote school safety and good behavior.

With PBIS, schools teach kids about behavior expectations and strategies.

The focus of PBIS is prevention, not punishment.

PBIS recognizes that students can only meet behavior expectations if they know what the expectations are. Everyone learns what's considered appropriate behavior. And they use a common language to talk about it. Throughout the school day — in class, at lunch, and during recreation— students understand what's expected of

them.

A PBIS board is completed each month with a hint or clue of what the PBIS celebration will be at the end of the month. The students names and number of points earned are displayed on the board as well as the number of points they can receive to attend the celebration.
